About the National Art Honor Societies

In 1978, the NAEA began the NAHS program specifically for high school students in grades 10-12, for the purpose of inspiring and recognizing those students who have shown an outstanding ability in art. The NAHS also strives to aid members in working toward the attainment of their highest potential in art areas, and to bring art education to the attention of the school and community.

In 1989, the NAEA introduced the NJAHS as a separate organization from the NAHS. This program, specifically for students in grades 7-9, was designed to help generate interest in art programs and inspire and recognize the younger art student. The NJAHS students are members of a distinguished group of art students.

Current information as of June 2007:

- 2824 NAHS chapters and 577 NJAHS chapters registered
- Approximately 32,000 NAHS students and 1,700 NJAHS students participate through their school's chapter

NAHS News

NAHS News is the official newsletter of the National Art Honor Society. Published twice a year (December and April), it contains feature articles on careers in art, preparation of portfolios, news on NAHS chapter activities, student artwork, and information on financial aid. Each NAHS member receives his/her own copy; each chapter sponsor receives complimentary copies. Total circulation is over 35,000.

Experts in selected topics and 7-12 teachers are encouraged to submit papers. Topics might include careers in art, preparing portfolios, college admissions procedures, financial aid information including scholarships, and other news or information relevant to middle and/or high school students.

Articles should be limited to around 1,000 words. Submissions of images that enhance the text are encouraged. APA style is preferred.
